Parental consent form to be obtained for close contact with the dog. Parents/carers to be offered programme of support for child to help overcome aversion. Visitors to be advised of school dog on site on arrival and the dog moved to safe space if necessary. Notice signs displayed in each school advising of presence of the school dog and noted on Federation website.	C	1	L

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Dog bite/scratching.	<b>3</b>	Pupil/staff member/visitor bitten or scratched by dog.	✓	✓	✓	✓	✓	<p>School dog will always be in the care of a responsible adult and will never be allowed to freely roam the school premises when children are in school. Dog to be kept on lead when walking around the school premises.</p> <p>School dog trained to have no mouth/teeth contact and to respond to “no” command.</p> <p>Pupils should approach dog in a calm and appropriate manner.</p> <p>Pupils should never have the opportunity to hit or hurt school dog.</p> <p>Regular reminders should be given to all pupils on the rules of how to behave in the company of the school dog which should also be on display in all classrooms.</p> <p>School dog trained not to jump up.</p> <p>School dog’s claws to be kept trimmed to reduce the risk of scratches.</p> <p>Staff to regularly monitor the dog’s temperament, behaviour and mood.</p> <p>All immunisations are kept up to date as directed by the vet.</p>	<b>B</b>	<b>2</b>	<b>M</b>
